# Warm Welcome on a freezing Friday

ary weather, hundreds of members of Forward in Faith and parishes in the Northern Province that look to the Bishop of Beverley for pastoral care travelled to York Minster on the feast of the Conversion of St Paul, to witness the consecration of Canon Glyn Webster as their new Father in God.

Archbishop Sentamu celebrated the Mass. His predecessor, Lord Hope, warned Bishop Glyn of the enormous task that lay ahead. "Many of the parishes you will serve are in urban areas right there in the thick of it, in the thick of the challenges and upheavals and struggles of local people and where the church's influence in its prophetic service together with other agencies both voluntary and statutory are deeply committed to making those words of Jesus a reality - 'I came that all may have life - life in all its abundance'. It's both a costly and costing ministry on the part of the clergy and their families as well as the members of their congregations."

Essential for the task is a strong spiritual life. "Never become so busy or so immersed

in the clamour both of the church and the world that you do not and cannot make the time daily to stop, to be still, to be silent - simply to be with Jesus - to watch and to pray."

More than forty bishops from both provinces joined in the consecration, watched by over a hundred robed priests in the north transept, and the congregation that filled the nave. After the service, which lasted just over two hours, the bishops assembled with their new colleague outside the west door for photographs (which can be seen on the new Beverley website); then Bishop Glyn returned to be greeted by his new flock as they left the Minster.

Only two days his consecration, Bishop Glyn made his first pastoral visit to one of his parishes. He joined the people of St Paul's, Royton in the Diocese of Manchester as they celebrated their Patronal Festival on 27 January. Around 240 people, including lots of children, visitors from other parishes and 12 concelebrating clergy enjoyed a magnificent Sung Mass. A Party followed in the Parish Centre and the proceedings concluded with fireworks.

9th November 1933 - 27th December 2012

STHE sun was setting on a grey January afternoon and mourners gathered in the rural setting of All Saints, Calverton, Stony Stratford there was an overwhelming feeling of an era drawing to its close. Mary Sanders had died on 27th December, a death that was not unexpected. She told those close to her of the terminal illness diagnosed in the spring in a typically matter-of-fact fashion, but the end was as sudden as it was peaceful.

The country church was crowded – family, parishioners, friends of all ages, a scattering of clergy and a bishop. After the funeral mass her body was interred in the churchyard, not far from the porch, whilst in the darkness her family held a dozen or more decorative lanterns at the head of her grave - something that would have both delighted and amused Mary.

### Full and rich life

Mary Sanders led a full and rich life. Born in Southampton on 9th November 1933, she studied mathematics at Royal Holloway College before meeting and marry-

ing Fr Graham Sanders. Devoted wife and mother, she actively supported Graham's ministry including a spell in India from 1960-68. In latter years the vision of Mary in a wonderful blue and gold sari was a sight to behold, rather reminiscent of a spectacular galleon in full sail.

Throughout marriage Mary maintained a distinguished teaching career together with wholehearted commitment to the Church. Though not blind to its failings, she loved the Church of England and was firm in her own catholic faith but was horrified by the decision of '92. As a consequence Fr Graham resigned under the Measure in 1994, a decision she fully supported, and they moved from Guiseley to live in Shipley within the Diocese of Brad-

ford. Mary established a very comfortable home where they frequently entertained and gave shelter to any in need.

### Steadfast in the faith

"Cometh the hour, cometh the man?" though in this case she was a woman. In the dark days of the early 90's, when morale amongst traditionalists was very low, Mary worked tirelessly to establish Forward-in-Faith within the Diocese of Bradford. She was secretary and the driving power of the Diocesan branch from the mid 90's until shortly before she and Fr Graham moved to Stony Stratford in 2008.

Never afraid to lobby bishops, her style might be described as gentle but firm, never strident, constantly suggesting ways in which our constituency could be accommodated within the Church of England. It seemed that she knew every member of Bradford Forward in Faith personally – several hundred of them. There was no prospect of traditionalists capitulating whilst Mary was around.

### Gentle, wise and perceptive

Gentle, wise and perceptive, Mary was possessed of great stillness together with a sense of optimism, which tended to draw people toward her. Not in the least "fuddy-duddy" it was easy to forget her age particularly as she had a young outlook on life and a twinkle was never far from Mary's eye. Mary had particular empathy with the young, attempting to make their way in the world. As a consequence, she had a wide range of friends of all ages and backgrounds.

### No spiritual lightweight

Mary possessed an active mind that sought constant employment resulting in an enormous range of interests, including cooking, needlework and lace making. Needlework skills were often used in the production of vestments and church furnishings. A great conversationalist, she embraced a ministry of generous hospitality.

No spiritual lightweight, she exemplified a holiness that valued simplicity and would often discern the Holy Spirit at work in the lives of others. She was quick at getting to the heart of the matter and, somewhat disarmingly, was perfectly adept at giving spiritual advice whilst teaching the intricacies of making bobbin lace - part of the subtle secret of her very great charm. She was a constant source of wise and holy

Mary was resolute and bold in her beliefs; courageously making a speech at the National Assembly of Forwardin-Faith in October knowing it would be her last. Invariably gracious and courteous toward those with whom she disagreed, Mary suffered fools gladly. Hers was a strong personality but not one that overwhelmed others. Indeed, Mary always saw the best in others and this, in turn, brought out the best in them.

Mary set about involving herself in parish life and continued her work for Forward in Faith by continued her work for Forward in Faith by being one of the parish's Lay Representatives at the National Assembly and a Committee Member of the FiF Oxford Region, serving for a while as the Membership Secretary. Her care and concern for family and friends was soon extended to a wide circle of people locally, and her experience and wisdom were shared with many, especially the Parish Priest. She faced her final illness with great courage and fortitude and to the end ensured that Fr Graham was well cared for. She died peacefully, having been fortified by the Rites of Holy Church.

**God Calling: Living Priesthood** 

**Father Darren Smith, General Secretary of** the Additional Curates Society, tells us about the Vocations Day in December at the Old Saint Pancras Team Ministry


### Unworthy

His Enthronement in Canterbury Cathedral will be on 21st March, the first day of Spring, in time for him to preside at the celebrations of





He takes office at a time when the tide of aggressive secularism and the growth of Islam threaten the erosion of the Christian civilisation that we hold dear. As Archbishop Sentamu said at the Election Confirmation service, we live in an age of "seemingly unprecedented selfishness, in a society obsessed with individualism

and rights." We also face the continuing uncertainty of the place of traditionalists in our Church: fightings within and fears without, in the words of the well-known hymn. Both as Dean of Liverpool and as Bishop of Durham he has displayed an openness and willingness to engage sympathetically with those who, unlike him, are not convinced of the rightness of the Church of England's decision to ordain women.

In his employment before ordination we are told that he had a reputation for shrewdness and fairness in finding solutions to problems.

Forward in Faith assures him of our earnest prayers as he begins his new task of giving moral and spiritual leadership to the Nation and a prophetic voice to the Church. And we trust that, with the grace of God, the oil that he pours upon the troubled waters of our beloved Church will be the oil of healing and gladness.

# In his own write...

# From the **Editor's** desk

Chapter, rather like the staff of the Theological College, has always seemed to me to be the natural habitat of a variety of clerics who range from the mildly eccentric to the near-certifiable. No doubt they have a similar view in the former of the parochial clergy, and in the latter of the students in their charge.

It was in Southwark Cathedral in the 1960s that I first encountered the full range, with its

Bishop Mervyn Stockwood, the Provost Ernie Southcott, and a particular Canon, John Pearce-Higgins. Stockwood, who loved Anglo-catholic ceremonial, forced the resignation of Fr Harris at St Andrew's Carshalton for celebrating the Assumption and using the Roman Missal.

He was often seen wearing secular dress, so that the popular press named him the "bowtie bishop", and I have heard it said that Henry Montgomery Campbell, Bishop of London, once encountered him at Westminster in his clerical suit and greeted him, "Ah, Stockwood! Incognito, I see." Canon Pearce-Higgins was a devotee of mediums and the supernatural, claiming to have heard the disembodied voice of the American Bishop Pike who had perished after being lost in a desert somewhere, and reportedly attended séances with episcopal approval.

### Choral evensong

I was reminded of him recently when I received an invitation to preach at Southwark Cathedral vice, and read the Lesson at it in 1964.


Some of our boys sang in the cathedral choir; others were choristers at the Queen's Chapel of the Savoy in the Strand. We Savoy choristers, trained by Dr William Cole, would sometimes attend choral evensong to hear Harold Dexter's lads. On one such oc-

casion Canon Pearce-Higgins approached the lectern, announced that the portion of Scripture appointed for the second lesson was from the Book of Revelation, from whatever chapter and verse, continued, "But I have no intention of reading such blasphemous nonsense" read a poem instead.

### Glorious music, splendid suppér

For the Glaziers' ser-vice the Master read the lesson, the presentation of Christ in the temple, and we all held candles

during the singing of Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in Stanford's glorious B flat setting. It was very moving to hear the choir performing so beautifully with enthusiasm and obvious enjoyment. The tools of the glaziers' craft were



Worshipful Company of Glaziers and Painters of Glass - an odd engagement, you might think, for the vicar of a dual-purpose building on a Liverpool housing estate that has no stained glass windows.



But the invitation came, via the Dean, from my old friend Michael Broadway, an organ builder and accomplished musician, who was the organist forty years ago at the church in North London where I served my first curacy. Michael tunes the grand organ at Christ the King, Gordon Square.

We have kept in touch over the years, and he gave me the honour of preaching for the service as this is his year of office as Master of the Company. I knew the cathedral quite well, having visited it first as a child with a group from St Stephen's, Lewisham, as part of the diocesan Golden Jubilee celebrations in 1955.


Then, as a pupil at St Olave's Grammar School in nearby Tooley Street, I sang there in the school choir for our yearly Commemoration of Benefactors' serpresented and blessed before we sang the final hymn proclaiming fittingly "craftsman's art and mu sic's measure for thy pleasure all combine."

Near the cathedral is Glaziers' Hall, where Bishops Jonathan Baker and Norman Banks invited us for refreshments after their episcopal ordination in 2011. Here a splendid supper was served in the upper hall overlooking the Thames, while conversation and fine wine flowed freely.





# Sermon For Ben Rabjohns' First Mass

'Friends, Romans, countrymen, lend me your ears'

TELL, this is a very special occasion, and I am still overwhelmed with the privilege of being asked to preach tonight that I though I'd try something different as a beginning; but I've now got doubts!

Friends is OK. I'm sure we are all friends here.

Romans is a bit worrying: after all I once had someone leave the church choir because I was making them sing Roman Catholic music - whatever that means - so there might be suspicions of Romanizing tendencies.

And as for countrymen, that's bad enough from an English man – even after 36 years living in Wales – but a real problem for someone from Swansea preaching in Port Talbot!

But, let it pass and continue the quote from the bard with a change of names.

'Friends, Romans, countrymen, lend me your ears. I come to bury Ben, not to praise him.

There is a sense in which all the Sacraments of the Church involve a sort of dying.

In the Sacrament of Penance we die to our sins through our repentance. In Marriage we die to individual living and the two become one flesh. In Anointing the powers of sin and the evil one are vanquished.

And this is especially true of the primary Sacraments of Initiation – Baptism and Confirmation. St Paul tells us that \*All of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death'

Each one of us here has died with Christ and because of that we have and indelible new identity.

Because of our Baptism we become something new, we become permanently ambassadors for Christ. Each one of us in our vocation and ministry has the task of spreading the Kingdom of God, of bringing others to that wonderful place we have found where Jesus is King of our hearts and lives.

And within the fellowship of the Baptised there is another dying, another vocation, another Sacrament which bestows a new and permanent character and identity.

Last night in the Cathedral there were three deaths. Ben, Mark and Jonathan, as they were ordained priests, died. They were changed. They became something new. As they were clothed in priestly garments it was as if they were being taken over and entering into something new - something new and exciting.

To be clothed with the chasuble is a sign and a symbol, a sacramental action, of the putting on of Christ. Ben and all called to the priestly office become Christ in a new and special way.

As a sort of aside I should say that someone recently said that as well as hiding the person and clothing him with Christ, under the chasuble may be hidden either a ladder or a towel. Those who come with the hidden ladder are seeking promotion and advancement and therefore ultimately glory for themselves. But the true way of being a priest is to carry with us at all time the towel entrusted to us when we became deacons with which like Christ we shall wash the feet of the world and be at all times servants of the servants of God.

To be a priest is not a job. It doesn't stop when we clock off. It doesn't even stop when we retire – for we only retire from being paid and being hassled! It is difficult to see how it can be subject to appraisal. It is a life.

Of course we are still the same human beings we were before ordination. We have our individual characters and features, some good and some bad— and how good to be reminded last night that ours is a religion of mercy, a mercy I need after 47 years in this role. We will, like all our brothers and sisters in the Church, evangelise, teach, counsel, comfort and show the love of the Saviour to those around us.

But we also become something new. We become in a spe-

cial and real way the presence of Christ. There is only one Priest in the Church, He whom the writer of the letter to the Hebrews calls our Great High Priest, Jesus Christ. And Ben and all called to this place in the Church share in, show forth and make present the priesthood of Christ

St Ambrose writes of the priests;
'Do not consider their outward appearance but the grace of their ministries. There is no place of deception nor for denial: he is the angel who proclaims the kingdom of Christ and eternal life. You must not make your assessment of him according to his appearance, but according to his office. Consider what he transmitted, reflect upon his function, recognise

In his sermon at the Golden Jubilee of Canon Harold Clarke Bishop David Thomas quoted a saying of Dom Gregory Dix that the Priest is always saying Mass.

I have already said that we do, of course, do more. We do all the things that all Christians are called to do. We care for and visit our people; we lead them in the paths of life everlasting; we share their joys and their sorrows.

But at the heart of the life of the priest there is the taking of all that is of this world, our life, our bread and our wine and returning it to the Father with thanksgiving and through this action giving to the people of God the true Manna from heaven, the Body and Blood of Christ.

It is an awesome privilege and can never be taken for granted. I overheard a conversation last Saturday between Ben and Bishop Norman Banks. In response to the Bishop's question Ben said he was feeling nervous to which Bishop Norman said, 'Good! The time to worry is when we stop feeling nervous.' Every day the Priest must thanks God for his calling and strive with all his might through prayer and repentance to live up to his calling.

I began by speaking of dying and coming to bury Ben. But there is more to this wonderful story of ours.

We heard in the first reading tonight how the dead bones can come to life through the Spirit

being breathed into them, the first-fruits of the Spirit that St Paul talks of, that Our Lord says is the satisfying of the thirst of the hungry soul.

> Come with me to the 18th century.

It was the Dover road that lay, on a Friday, be-yond the Dover mail, as it lumbered up Shooter's Hill. ,,,,, the hill,

and the harness, and the mud, and the mail, were all so heavy, that the horses had three times already come to a stop, besides once drawing the coach across the road, with the mutinous intent of taking it back to Blackheath.

There was a steaming mist in all the hollows, and it had roamed in its forlornness up the hill, like an evil spirit, seeking rest and finding none. A clammy and intensely cold mist, it made its slow way through the air in ripples that visibly followed and overspread one another, as the waves of an unwholesome sea might do. It was dense enough to shut out everything from the light of the coach-lamps but these its own workings, and a few yards of road; and the reek of the labouring horses steamed into it, as if they had made it all.

The Dover mail was in its usual genial position that the guard suspected the passengers, the passengers suspected one another and the guard, they all suspected everybody else, and the coachman was sure of nothing but the horses; as to which cattle he could with a clear conscience have taken his oath on the two Testaments that they were not fit for the journey.

The last burst carried the mail to the summit of the hill. The horses stopped to breathe again, and the guard got down to skid the wheel for the descent, and open the coach-

Now there was the sound of a horse at a canter approaching. The coachman and guard were way and drew weapons as they challenged the horseman. It turned out he had a message for one of the passengers; this was duly delivered and read and a verbal reply given to be taken back to London

Jerry, say that my answer was, RECALLED TO LIFE.

And as Jerry the messenger rode back to London he said over and over again to himself: 'Recalled to Life!

That's a Blazing strange message!'

Recalled to life: a blazing strange

That dying in which we all share by our baptism, the further dyings of our pilgrimage to our heavenly homeland and the dying that is at the heart of becoming a priest are only dy ings so that we may be recalled

And we need to remember what a blazing strange message this is. No half hearted commitment to being good

and kind, to being honest and respectable. No comfortable, cosy religion. But the blazing strange message of being recalled to life.

It is a message that is both life giving and life enhancing, a message that must be proclaimed in words but even more

If we have died with Christ we shall also rise with him. To go back to St Paul's letter to the Romans 'we were buried therefore with him by baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life'

Fr Gilbert Shaw, whom Ben and I know through our life as Associates of the Community of the Servants of the Will of God wrote prophetically:

If we can give ourselves to prayer, God will do all things. We are meeting a new situation in the world today, that of a pagan society to which the only answer is the demonstra-tion of what living for God means. Why is the Church so ineffective? It is through lack of prayer.

In all the crisis periods of history it has been through the witness of the suffering saints that the Church has been purified and new patterns of order have been brought into the disordered world. The real flame of utter givenness that is world saving.

We are not to recover the traditionalism of some recent past that trusts to conservatism for security, that is blind to the present judgement upon the world. We must recover the great tradition that life comes through death. That is surely the meaning of the Gospel for today. It is through dying in Christ's death that men come alive in his resur-

Brothers and sisters, we share, here and now, in the dying in Christ's death that men come alive in his resurrection.

If Ordination and the other Sacraments are about dying the Eucharist is the other side of that coin. This is where we eat and drink the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation; this is where the death we have undergone like Christ on the Cross is defeated by the Power and Wisdom of God, by the Lifegiving Spirit. Here we are recalled to life

And those of us who have the privilege of ministerial priesthood are called to show forth that blazing strange message in a special and unique way.

Each time when Christ through our words gives forgiveness and absolution, each time when with our hands and our lips Christ takes bread and wine and transforms them into his Body and Blood the blazing strange message ceases to be just words and becomes reality

We are indeed recalled to life,

# Topical Issues Survey PROVINCE

HEN issues like Women Bishops are discussed in Governing Body or in more local groups it is often said that we are seeking the mind of the Church on the issue. Yet there is doubt whether these elected bodies really represent the views of ordinary men and women in our church. One way of trying to find out what people really think is to use a research organisation which will seek to find a representative sample.

You may have read in the November 2012 issue of New Directions that a survey of views on topics of concern to Anglicans had been conducted and perhaps wondered if the same sort of responses would be forthcoming in Wales.

Well, over the summer Christian Research, a respected independent organisation, undertook a similar exercise on behalf of Credo Cymru. Because of the size of our country and church the base was smaller but was selected to cover as wide a spectrum of the population as possible.

One big advantage of this survey is that it is conducted on line and no one has to identify themselves or stand up and be counted. Thus we avoid the inevitable bias generated by having to declare one's views publicly. This is much more effective than looking for trends from votes in diocesan and deanery meetings were minority views are never easy

In the survey conducted on our behalf almost half those surveyed were ordained and the rest were lay men and women. Just under 2/3<sup>rd</sup> were male. 43% or respondents were under 54 and 77% were married. There is a balanced spread across churchmanship/ style of worship with a moderate inclination towards traditionalist Anglo Catholic or Central/Broad (55%)

The commitment of those surveyed could be seen from the fact that 95% of them attended church at least once a week with 71% more than once. 85% prayed daily or most days and 63% said the same about reading the Bible. In the light of that it was not surprising that over 70% said they had no doubts about the existence of God with another 26% saying that though they had doubts they still believed. Not surprisingly in the light of these facts over half said that their faith was the most important thing in their life with a further third saying that it was more important than most things in

When it comes to statements about belief we find that in general well over 90%agree or strongly agree with basic tenets of the creed about the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit though there are some reservations about the virgin birth and the physical resurrection of Our Lord.

Clearly, of the many issues facing the Church in Wales at the moment the one we were most concerned about was the possibility of the consecration of women as bishops. In Question 10 55% said that this should happen within the next 5-10 years or when a greater consensus is reached among all the churches or never with less than half saying as soon as possible.

If the Church were to proceed along this road more than two thirds (70%) consider that those opposed to the ordination of female bishops are faithful Anglicans who should not be forced out of the Church in Wales are should be enabled to stay in the Church in Wales by some form of provision which meets their position of conscience while only 4% think they have no business of being in the Church in Wales any longer. 7% feel that there should be greater consensus before proceeding with this innovation.

Looking at the Anglican Covenant over half those taking part did not think that Provinces should be free to pursue their own agendas with 76% saying that they must be accountable to each other of the Communion is to survive. 44% said that the Church in Wales should side with the conservative rovinces of Africa and Asia rather than the liberal ones of North America

Looking at bishops in the Church in Wales 88% thought it important that they should be faithful to biblical teaching, with a similar number saying they should be innovative in terms of strategic decision making. 2/3rds of those responding thought bishops should have a minimum of 10 years parochial experience and a large majority thought they should respond to social issues. Opinion was fairly evenly divided on whether we had the right system for appointing bishops though nearly half thought there should be an open application process.

# One Generation from Extinction

THE author of this book, Mark Griffiths talked to a number of people at a diocesan training event about his book and some of the concepts that it is based on. Key to his theories about work with children and young people are the principles of the early days of Sunday School in the church. Sunday School began with a man called Robert Raikes in c.1780. Raikes was a man who saw a need in his community and responded to it, this response to a need should always be at the beginning of evangelism.

Sunday school children predominantly came from unchurched backgrounds and within eight years of the start of the movement there were 300,000 children connected with the church through Sunday School. By 1910, according to Mark Griffiths, figures show that 85% of children were in contact with the church in this way.

The principles in early Sunday School, Griffiths identifies as such;

Professional teachers - the success of Sunday School was largely dependent upon the fact that teachers were recruited carefully and they were people equipped, willing and able to do the job. Sunday School declined when educationalists stepped in and required more structure, in turn, requiring more teachers who were more difficult to recruit. The system ended up recruiting poorer teachers in the time of need and therefore the scheme itself suffered.

Young people as leaders - This point is key to keeping and growing children in church. If they are reached by Sunday School then the aim is to nurture them to a point where they themselves can become leaders, giving them ownership and a sense of belonging. Recruit to a vision - When looking for people to lead Sunday School, or any kind of ministry with children and young people, it is important that they are recruited not just because it's something that needs to be done and needs somebody to do it. It is

a vital ministry and the vision needs to be

of the projects that are reaching more than 100 children had leaders who had been to a training session in the last twelve months. Teachers need to be recruited and trained professionally to ensure the quality of what is being offered.

Rewards, Prizes and Incentives - Griffiths' proposes the use of incentives to encourage attendance, this element of hospitality is important to make the children feel secure and at home. Offering food and drink is a Biblical principle of welcome. More importantly even than this is Griffiths' suggestion to offer these prizes for things that in general, society doesn't reward. Not for sporting prowess or musical ability but for kindness, gentleness or self control.

Responding to a need - Griffiths returns to this important catalyst for evangelism. That whatever is done in the name of Jesus to work with children and young people is done in the context of a social dimension which takes into account the circumstances and situations of those children.

Hymn singing and prayer - Griffiths argues that this is part of the community that is built up by Sunday School type groups and that song is also a way of teaching theology. Research has also shown that children and young people want to be more of a part of liturgy and worship in churches, not just singing but a more profound involvement. This, it could be argued is there desire for a sacramental involvement and response.

Community Links - One of the most important points made by Griffiths is that as much as projects such as Śunday School might succeed in bringing children to church, it is also vital that the message of Jesus is brought to people where they are and that what happens in Sunday School links back to the every day lives of the children who attend.

Church Links - In the same way, the Sunday School or youth project that happens in a church cannot be an 'add on' to what happens on a Sunday morning, it cannot be an 'optional extra'. What is crucial is that the work with children and young people is embedded at the centre of what is done as whole church family.

# Template for a Youth Group Session

- This session is designed to be used as part of a series teaching about the Bible
- Old or New Testament game draw a line across the room and ask the young people to all stand on one side of it. Draw names of books of the Bible out a hat and ask the young people to jump to one side if they think it is Old Testament and the other side if they think it is New Testament
- Discuss the Books of the Bible, how many? Introduce the idea that some books are letters
- Game write a letter as a group one word at a time to tell someone about Jesus. Say one word each going round

Paul wrote lots of letters, the one we're going to think about today is his letter to the Ephesians.

Ephesians - Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God – the Bible as our tool for Sal-

Bible race to find Ephesians 6:10-20 (give two young people a Bible each and say the reference only twice, they race to see who can find the chapter and verse first!) Ephesians 6:10-20

Put on the full armour of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the **belt** of truth buckled around your waist, with the armour of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the shoes to preach the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, to defend you from the evil one. Take the hel**met** of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

### Get people to try on – a selection of belts, shoes and hats. When might you wear certain ones?

Message – we need the right equipment for the right job.

God says that he gives us the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit which is the word of God. He gives us the Bible, the word of God to help us in our lives. But this isn't so that we can fight or hurt other people, it's so that we can win against things which try to hurt us or which make our lives difficult. Think of things we've already learned. If I'm having a bad day and

perhaps feeling really sad I can think about Psalm 23, think about Jesus being my good shepherd and leading me to places that are good, I might be like some of you who have wandered off when I was supposed to be following but he will bring me back. The Bible helps us to know God and to know Jesus so that he can help us every day.

Saul was a man who has been persecuting people who follow Jesus. He is making a journey to a place called Damascus.

Split into groups - to rehearse a drama about Paul's conversion then perform to everyone to tell the story

Message - Saul becomes Paul and becomes a person who uses the word of God to tell people about Jesus.

Activity - How do we spread the good news today? Church, Youth Group, School, talking to friends, doing things community, the advertising... What is the message? Love, Salvation, Good News, God loves you... Love, Salva-Making t-shirts to spread the message like an advert (buy plain white t-shirts and transfers or graffiti pens, get the young people to put their name on the back and design the message on the front for the world to know.

Steamed Puddings

A light and versatile favourite with the family especially when served with freshly prepared pouring

### INGREDIENTS:

Serves 4 2 oz Sugar

2 oz Butter

1 Egg 5 oz Self Raising Flour Pinch of Baking Powder Water to mix (Equal to one egg)

This is the "basic" sponge

recipe.
For a SYRUP / JAM /
MARMALADE sponge you will need 2 tblsps. of your choice placed in the bottom of

the pudding basin.
For a CHERRY(glace) sponge
you will need 1 ½ oz. placed in the bottom of the pudding basin.

For a FRUIT sponge you will need 3 oz. dried fruit to fold into the sponge mixture.

For a CHOCOLATE sponge replace 1 oz. of flour with 1 oz of cocoa powder, (not hot chocolate powder).

### METHOD:

Have a 2 pint pudding basin ready (I use one with a snap on lid), a large saucepan and a kettleful of boiling water. In a bowl blend the Sugar and Butter then beat until light and fluffy. Add the Egg and beat again.

Sift the Flour(s) before gently folding into the mixture until combined. Add the water until the correct consistency is achieved. Then, without disturbing the contents of the pudding basin, add the mixture

You should first grease the basin if you are making a Cherry or a Chocolate pudding. Cover the basin with the lid.

Have a little hot water in the bottom of the saucepan. Lower the basin into the pan and then top it up with boiling water to exceed the level of the sponge in the pudding basin.

Reduce the heat to allow the water to simmer. Continue steaming for 1 ¼ hours adding more boiling water as necessary. Don't let it boil dry!

Turn out on to a large warmed plate and serve.

# THERE WERE GIANTS IN THE LAND

# A series of portraits of great Anglo-Catholics

N THURSDAY 21st February this year the parish of St Alban the Martyr, Holborn, celebrated the 150th anniversary of the church's consecration. The church, rebuilt after being almost totally destroyed by bombing in the Second World War, has from its beginning been at the forefront of the Catholic movement in the Church of England. One of the parts that survived the bombing is the beautiful small chapel to the left of the entrance to the church itself, dedicated to the memory of its first Vicar, Fr Mackonochie. A fearless pioneer of the revival of dignified and reverent ceremonial in the services of the Church, he was mercilessly persecuted by extreme Protestants. After twentyfive years of devoted service to the poor of London, he died, confused and lost in a snow storm in the forest of Mamore whilst staving with his friend the Bishop of Argyll.

### **Catholic Revival**

From the beginning of his work in Holborn, Mackonochie was supported by Arthur Henry Stanton, one of the greatest and most attractive figures of the Catholic Revival. Sixty years after his death there was a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving for his life and work. It was a wonderful service, with a number of people there who had known or heard him. The address, a fitting and worthy tribute, was given by a fine and powerful preacher, Fr Colin Gill, of St Magnus the Martyr, London bridge. At the end, he paused and said, "You will notice that at the beginning I gave you no text. I give it now. From the Book of Genesis, chapter 6, verse 4: There were giants in the land in those days." It was a moment which I have never forgotten. To that we owe the title of this series of portraits of those who, with Stanton, changed the face of the Church of England. Give thanks for him on the centenary of his death this year, on Maundy Thursday.

Born in Stroud, Gloucestershire, on 21st June 1839, he was the youngest of eleven children. It was a Christian family, and the young Arthur took his religion seriously.

### **Arthur Henry Stanton SSC** 1839 - 1913

He was fond of churches and enjoyed attending services. His father, a former naval officer, was a successful manufacturer who sent his son to be educated at Rugby and Trinity College, Oxford. He arrived in Oxford in 1858, and in the following year came under the influence of Dr H.P.Liddon, Vice-Principal of St Edmund Hall and Dr Pusey's friend and biographer, and one of the noted preachers

### **Holborn mission**

After taking his degree, Stanton moved on to Cuddesdon where he spent six months in training with

Robert Suckling (with whom he would later work) and Edward King, later the saintly Bishop of Lincoln. His holidays were spent working in the missionary district of Holborn, a squalid and overcrowded slum soon to become St Alban's parish. There he accepted a title with Fr Mackonochie and was made deacon in Advent 1862, priest at Trinity 1864. The church building was not completed until February 1863, so his first services were conducted in a cellar off the Gray's Inn Road. Bishop Tait warned him that if he went to St Alban's he should expect no preferment. For the rest of his ministry he neither sought nor received preferment, instead he worked for fifty years as honorary assistant curate. His wealth, his health and strength, his gifts and talents were all dedicated to the service of God and his people. He lived simply, spending little on himself (and then not the capital that had been left to him, but only the interest), but giving lavishly to the church and to the poor.



Mackonochie founded guilds, a nursery, a parish school for five hundred children, obtained a private burial ground for the parish, and set up an insurance association to ensure proper funerals and graves for the poor. The clergy of St Alban's believed in the Incarnation and so regarded as their responsibility the welfare of their parishioners in body as in soul. Stanton soon showed that he was a man of unconventional passions, with the courage of the rebel. In social and political matters he was always for the underdog. He supported keenly the Guild of St Matthew, Stewart Headlam's Christian socialist organization. As a Christian, he was instinctively against everything that was unfair, sordid, unjust or even merely material. "I know no Liberalism," he once declared, "except that which I sucked in from the breasts of the Gospel." He was always willing to help where help was needed. He established the St Alban's Club for Working Men and was soon in trouble with critics for allowing beer and spirits and cards there. "As long as they don't get drunk or gamble, where is the harm in a glass of grog or a rubber of whist?" he asked. One of his great efforts, which attracted the help of the young Robert Dolling (later the of the Portsmouth slums) was the St Martin's League for Postmen. There were no strings attached to his work: Fr Stanton simply showed the Gospel in action and let his actions speak for themselves. His love for Christ's flock, from highest to lowest, for men and women, boys and girls, of every walk in life, was transparent. He was there as shepherd. And even the roughest understood the message of self-sacrifice and unconditional love that was offered to them over half a century. He was at ease in the company of any group or individual, and had unfailing humour, patience and goodness. He might be

'Mr' Stanton to the outside world, and 'Father' to the people of St Alban's, but to many thousands who knew him as comrade, friend and guide, he was known affectionately as 'Dad'.

### Persecution

Because of its proximity to the City of London, St Alban's became an early target for ritual protests. From the beginning Fr Mackonochie and his curates brought beauty and music into the dark and discordant lives of their worshippers. The Mass and the recitation of the Offices were the centre of their daily worship,

and confession at the heart of their teaching. From 1867 onwards Mackonochie was brought before one court after another by protestors who objected to the forms of worship introduced to the new church. Complaints over candles and vestments, posture and intonation were issued constantly. After 15 years of this the vicar was broken in health and forced to resign. This relentless persecution had its inevitable effect on the other clergy including Stanton. Early in his ministry, Fr Stanton had made his mark as a preacher. He took as his model the famous Baptist preacher Charles Spurgeon and had lessons in elocution from the great actormanager Sir Henry Irving. Bishop Wilberforce attended a High Mass to see for himself what this new 'Ritualism' was. He heard Stanton preach, and wrote in his diary, 'he preached an earnest useful practical sermon on fasting, its duties, uses, difficulties and temptations - thoroughly evangelical, but rather an imitation of Liddon. As the years passed, Stanton drew enormous crowds on Sundays for the sermons and on Mondays for the mission service and addresses; but because of the ritual troubles, he was forbidden to preach in many places. Speaking at a meeting in 1907 he said that he had never preached a mission or taken a retreat outside the parish since 1875. He was by all accounts a very great preacher. He prepared his sermons thoroughly, and preached without notes. Volumes of notebooks of careful outlines (some published by his colleague Fr Russell) were found in his study after his death. A book of sermons noted verbatim by a shorthand expert also exists and provides an insight into his style. But those who heard him say that what made it a memorable experience was partly the reverence and love and faith of the man himself, and partly the vividness with which he presented his theme. It

was a wonderful combination of Evangelical fervour and Catholic teaching.

### Loving and beloved

In 1907 there was a great meeting at Holborn Town Hall to mark his forty-five years of ministry at St Alban's. He was presented with a chalice and paten, pictures of St Paul's Cathedral where he had been ordained, of St Alban's itself, and among other tributes, an address of love and loyalty signed by 3,600 men. His own speech was entirely in keeping with the oc-casion and the man himself: humorous and serious by turns, 'the revelation, wrote one observer 'of utter goodness, humanity and unselfish humility.' Surrounded by the love of so many people, he continued his ministry at St Alban's for another five years. On the last Sunday in November 1912, despite feeling ill, he said the early Mass and preached at the High Mass, as it proved, for the last time. He was nursed in the clergy house until January, then taken to his old home in Stroud to be cared for by his sister. His old friend and colleague of forty-six years, Fr Russell took him his communion on the Thursday after Easter, and he died the next morning, Friday 28th March 1913. "If he wills it, I am willing", were his last recorded words, just before the end.

### A great man

His body was brought back to St Alban's for the funeral. After the requiem it was taken for burial in the parish burial ground at Brookwood. The streets from Holborn to Waterloo Station were lined with many thousands of ordinary people whose lives he had touched. His four colleagues, Frs Suckling, Russell, Hogg and Pearkes, walked on either side of the bier and a hundred other priests followed in procession. 'A great man, a great Catholic Christian, a great preacher, a great friend: but above all, a great lover of our Lord Jesus Christ", said one tribute.

### Memorial

He had been a friend and admirer of the architect Ninian Comper, and it was to him that Fr Russell turned to design a chantry chapel at the east end of the south aisle of St Alban's in Stanton's memory. Details of the design and photographs of the completed work, which included a stone tomb-chest with a bronze effigy and a marble altar, can be seen in Sir Ninian Comper by Symondson and Bucknall (Spire Books 2006). Fr Russell described the completed work as "one of the superb monuments of modern times. erected to perpetuate one of the worthiest of the men who have been God's gift to us." Tragically, it was destroyed in the bombing; but the memory of Stanton lives on to encourage and inspire.
